#### What IS Autism?

- Neurodevelopmental disorder
  - Social impairments
  - Communication difficulties
  - Restricted interests/ repetitive behaviors
- Spectrum disorder
  - Mild to Severe
  - Think of a rope





### What ISN'T Autism?

A disease ..... NO!

• A virus ...... NO!

Contagious ..... NO!

Caused by vaccines .... NO!

Curable (unfortunately)





#### **Statistics**

- 1 in every 68 children in the US are diagnosed with autism
- 1 in 42 boys
- 1 in 189 girls
- Four boys to every one girl has autism or another type of developmental delay





### **Common Signs of Autism**

- Social:
  - Lack of eye contact
  - Withdrawn/extremely shy
  - Lack of empathy or understanding others points of view
  - May not read social cues
  - May not understand social situations or humor





### Common Signs of Autism

- Communication:
  - Difficulty speaking
  - Limited vocabulary or speech
  - May act or seem deaf
  - May use an alternative means of communication like sign language or an iPad or pictures
  - May be very literal
  - May repeat things or 'script'





### **Common Signs of Autism**

- **Behaviors:** 
  - Rock, twirl or spin themselves or objects
  - Tantrum or self-abuse (biting, head banging) for no apparent reason
  - May be affected by lights, sounds or smells (sensory)
  - May run off away from caregiver (elope)
  - May do other unusual movements with eyes or hands


Information overload

### HOW DO FAMILIES DECIDE ON TREATMENT AND CARE?

- Early evidenced-based interventions are proven to work over time
- Research all interventions, therapy and care options and talk with your team
- "Slow and Steady" really does win the race...progress takes TIME

### **DAILY LIFE**

There is no "normal"

Very often, just simple day to day activities are a challenge

Schedule, routines and preparation are KEY — many 'visitors' each day; doctors appointments, follow ups, etc.

## A Grandmother's Perspective:

- The only thing I knew about Autism: The 1988 movie RainMan; I could make NO connection with that to my 2 year old granddaughter.
- Acronyms were too many and they keep coming. Leave that to Amy
- Personal Grieving...Shoved aside for immediate action Action was easier.
- Dealing with a new reality and brould not be pirated or stolen for any reason



## A Grandmother's Perspective - 2:

- Struggle sharing diagnosis with others: Who knew some family members would have such high fenced boundaries?
- Packed suitcase, hit the road, do necessary daily tasks to free-up Amy's time to seek out, research and create a plan for Annie.





## A Grandmother's Perspective - 3:

Keep ALL my grandchildren happy.

## COPING – IT IS ESSENTIAL FOR FAMILIES TO ...

- Reach out and develop a support system – friends, doctors, families, support groups, church, neighbors
- Learn to ask for HELP
- Get involved to the level you can...
   therapy, child's day to day progress,
   fundraising, advocacy, school,
   siblings' activities
- Recognize the silver linings! In the midst of chaos, there are MANY gifts...

### FAMILY PRIVACY NO LONGER EXISTS

- —The home becomes a revolving door
- Boundaries of "home life" and "therapy life" may become blurred
- Families may want to be more involved but might be drained/ burned out or just don't know what to do

### UNDERSTANDING & ACCEPTANCE OF A DISABILITY

Affects each family differently

#### **KEY TAKE-AWAYS:**

- Having a family member with a disability can affect ALL ASPECTS of family's life: marriage, siblings, extended family, friends, teachers, neighbors, strangers, community
- Never assume you know fully what is going on
- Try not to make judgments or take things personally

### WHAT RESOURCES WOULD HAVE MADE MY LIFE EASIER?

- A "How To" Guide from the start (How to get MA; Wraparound 101; What is Autism? What is ABA?)
- Guidance to navigate the systems of care: Educational~Medical~Behavioral
   (Public school vs. approved private; outpatient services vs. residential; wraparound services)
- Connections with other families





### WHAT RESOURCES WOULD HAVE MADE MY LIFE EASIER?

- Transition planning at all ages (preschool, elementary, middle, high school, college, employment)
- Help to plan for the future ~ (special needs trusts, SSI, housing, waiver funding, .... what happens when I die??? ☺)
- DEVEREUX PROVIDES ALL OF THESE SERVICES!!!





#### THE FUTURE???

- Unknown even more than for the average family
- Teen years and puberty?
- College?
- Over 21 years old?
- Job? Where will they live?
- Marriage? Grandchildren?
- Financial Supports
- I can never die...





### Important Points to Remember

- Autism affects each family different
- If you know one individual with autism, you only know one individual with autism
- Even though they may show it differently, most people with autism hear and understand everything like you do
