

Introduction

Most states fund respite programs and services with state or federal funds, either alone or in partnership with private organizations. Such programs are generally designed to serve one or more specific populations, such as the aging; infants and toddlers; adults or children with physical, intellectual or developmental disabilities; children with special health care needs; children or adults with mental health conditions; kinship care providers; or children in state custody or foster parents.

Funding for respite is generally limited and may be dependent on state legislative action and/or the federal annual appropriations process. Federal budget cuts due to mandated sequestration may have further limited funding for state programs that depend on this support. Programs may be de-funded or eliminated altogether in times of fiscal crisis.

The information obtained for the state tables in this compilation was gathered from the internet, from phone interviews or email communication with representatives of state government agencies, State Lifespan Respite Programs or State Respite Coalitions, and has been verified to the extent possible. If specific pieces of information were not found or not verifiable, this is indicated in the table as "unknown." If you find information to be incorrect or incomplete, please alert [ARCH](#).

Federal Funding Sources for Respite

The most significant sources of federal funding for respite, which are described in detail elsewhere* but for the most part are not described in these tables, are:

- **Medicaid.** Home and Community-Based 1915(c) Medicaid Waivers are the largest federal funding source for respite. Populations that may be served by Medicaid waivers vary from state to state and may include or be limited to low-income seniors, individuals with developmental or intellectual disabilities, autism or traumatic brain injury, and others. Some waivers cover only children, only adults, or only the aging population. States may elect to serve certain populations, programs may have funding caps, and waiting lists may exist. Many states are transitioning Medicaid-eligible individuals with disabilities or chronic conditions to managed care for long-term services and supports or to new Medicaid options made available through the Affordable Care Act. It is advisable to check with your state Medicaid agency for the latest information on Medicaid funding for respite.

- The **National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFSCP)**. This program provides respite and other family caregiver support services to family caregivers caring for someone over age 60 or individuals of any age with Alzheimer's or other dementia. Also eligible for NFSCP services are relative caregivers over age 55 who are caring for individuals with disabilities, and to a limited extent, grandparents and other relatives, caring for a child under 18. - **Respite Resources for Veterans and Military Families**

For active duty military: Members receive health care through the [TRICARE](#) plan; a supplemental extended care health option (ECHO), available to active military who have family members with special needs, includes respite care as a benefit. The [Exceptional Family Member Program](#) (EFMP) in each branch of the military also offers support, including respite, to families that have members with special needs.

For veterans: Several programs support respite for veterans.

- The Millennium Health Care and Benefits Act of 1999 provides health care benefits; respite is included in the benefits package.
- Aid and Attendance and Housebound Benefits are two benefit programs that provide supplemental financial support to veterans with special needs who are receiving general Veterans Benefits and these funds can be used to pay for respite.
- Title IV of the Older Americans Act created an opportunity for the Veterans Administration to partner with the Administration on Aging to fund Veteran Directed Home and Community Based Services for veterans through Community Living Program grants.
- A Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers began in May 2011 and is administered under the Caregivers and Veterans Omnibus Health Services Act of 2010. Alternative State or Local Public Funding

Alternative public funding sources that may be available for respite, such as state and local tax levies and casino revenues, also may not be reflected in this document, but provide important sources of respite support in some states. A 2009 survey found that 15 states operated property-tax levies exclusively for senior services and facilities, including respite services. Six states used an income tax and another six states used a dedicated sales tax for this purpose. Four states reported using casino and lottery proceeds, and, one state reported using government bonds

to fund senior services.¹ Similar local funding sources may be used to support respite for children and adults with disabilities.

Private Funding Sources

National organizations such as Easter Seals, United Cerebral Palsy, The Arc, the Alzheimer's Foundation, the Alzheimer's Association, the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, the ALS Association, and others may support respite through state and local affiliates or chapters. Private community-based or faith-based respite services and programs, and other volunteer respite initiatives, may also provide respite at no or little cost to families.
